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Chapter 1: Welcome

Welcome to CA Application Delivery Analysis version 10.1. Review this document before you install or upgrade the CA Application Delivery Analysis software.

New in this Release

CA Application Delivery Analysis provides new and improved monitoring support:

Default entries for catch all private networks.

This feature reduces the amount of manual configuration required to start receiving data. Simply add a new monitor and add a server or server subnet and CA ADA will start receiving data.

The following entries are now included in the network list out of the box:

- All other 10 networks
 10.0.0/8
- All other 172.16 networks 172.16.0.0/12
- All other 192.168 networks 192.168.0.0/16
- New network types for Wireless and VPN networks

After completing a default installation, networks are pre-populated with RFC address space. Thresholds for slower Wireless and VPN network types are desensitized to 1/2 of the default threshold value.

Issues fixed in this release:

A problem where CA ADA did not issue an SNMP Trap Clear when an Incident is closed has been fixed.

Installation

This version of CA Application Delivery Analysis is a data source for:

- CA NetQoS Performance Center 6.1
- CA Performance Center 2.3 and 2.4

Perform a new installation of CA Application Delivery Analysis on Microsoft Windows Server 2008 R2 Standard Edition. When installing CA Application Delivery Analysis for the first time, you can choose to install on:

- A dedicated physical appliance
- A virtual machine

Upgrade

CA Application Delivery Analysis version 10.1 is a data source for:

- CA NetQoS Performance Center 6.1
- CA Performance Center 2.3 and 2.4

Upgrade CA Application Delivery Analysis from version 9.2 or 9.3 to version 10.1. If necessary, upgrade the product to version 9.2 in order to upgrade to version 10.1.

Important! The Standard Monitor and the ADA Manager must both be upgraded to version 10.1 to work properly. While the ADA Manager and a Standard Monitor are at different versions, the data collected by the monitoring device is not available for reporting.

We recommend upgrading your environment in the following order:

 Upgrade the Multi-Port Monitor appliances before you upgrade CA Application Delivery Analysis. The Multi-Port Monitor is compatible with CA ADA version 9.3, 10.0, and 10.1.

Important! CA ADA version 10.0 and 10.1 is **not** compatible with Multi-Port Monitor version 9.2. If you upgrade the CA ADA Manager to version 10.0 or 10.1, you will be required to upgrade a version 9.2 Multi-Port Monitor to version 10.0 or 10.1 to resume data collection.

- 2. Upgrade the Standard Monitors, if installed.
- 3. Upgrade the ADA Manager.
- 4. As part of the upgrade process, you should also plan to upgrade the following products, if installed, to the supported versions listed below:
 - CA Application Delivery Analysis Multi-Port Monitor version 10.1
 - CA GigaStor appliance with:
 - CA Observer version 16
 - CA GigaStor Connector version 10.0

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(ii) instances of applications, if any, configured to run on the operating system instance or

parts identified above.

There are two types of operating system environments, physical and virtual. A physical

operating system environment is configured to run directly on a physical hardware system.

The operating system instance used to run hardware virtualization software (e.g. Microsoft

Virtual Server or similar technologies) or to provide hardware virtualization services (e.g.

Microsoft virtualization technology or similar technologies) is considered part of the physical

operating system environment. A virtual operating system environment is configured to run Pg. 3

on a virtual (or otherwise emulated) hardware system.

A physical hardware system can have either or both of the following:

â?¢ Server. A server is a physical hardware system or device capable of running server software.

2. USE RIGHTS.

a. Assigning the License to the Server.

i. Before you run any instance of the server software under a software license, you must assign

that license to one of your servers. That server is the licensed server for that particular

license. You may assign other software licenses to the same server, but you may not assign

the same license to more than one server.

ii. You may reassign a software license, but not within 90 days of the last assignment. You may

reassign a software license sooner if you retire the licensed server due to permanent

hardware failure. If you reassign a license, the server to which you reassign the license

becomes the new licensed server for that license.

b. Running Instances of the Server Software. You may run, at any one time, one instance of

the server software in one physical operating system environment and one instance in one virtual

operating system environment on the licensed server.

If you run both permitted instances at the same time, the instance of the server software running

in the physical operating system environment may be used only to:

â?¢ run hardware virtualization software

â?¢ provide hardware virtualization services

â?¢ run software to manage and service operating system environments on the licensed server.

c. Running Instances of the Additional Software. You may run or otherwise use any number

of instances of additional software listed below in physical or virtual operating system

environments on any number of devices. You may use additional software only with the server

software directly, or indirectly through other additional software.

â?¢ AD Migration Tool

â?¢ FRS Monitoring Tools

â?¢ Remote Desktop Connection Client

â?¢ RSAT Client

â?¢ Server Migration Tool

d. Creating and Storing Instances on Your Servers or Storage Media. You have the

additional rights below for each software license you acquire.

â?¢ You may create any number of instances of the server software and additional software.

â?¢ You may store instances of the server software and additional software on any of your

servers or storage media.

â?¢ You may create and store instances of the server software and additional software solely to

exercise your right to run instances of the server software under any of your software

licenses as described above (e.g., you may not distribute instances to third parties).

e. Included Microsoft Programs. The software contains other Microsoft programs. These license

terms apply to your use of those programs.

3. ADDITIONAL LICENSING REQUIREMENTS AND/OR USE RIGHTS.

a. Windows Server 2003 Client Access Licenses (CALs).

i. You must acquire and assign the appropriate CAL to each device or user that accesses your

instances of the server software directly or indirectly. A hardware partition or blade is

considered to be a separate device.

â?¢ You do not need CALs for any user or device that accesses your instances of the server Pg. 4

software only through the Internet without being authenticated or otherwise individually

identified by the server software or through any other means.

â?¢ You do not need CALs for any of your servers licensed to run instances of the server

software.

â?¢ You do not need CALs for up to two devices or users to access your instances of the

server software only to administer those instances.

â?¢ You do not need CALs for any instance running in a physical operating system

environment used solely to

â?¢ run hardware virtualization software

â?¢ provide hardware virtualization services

â?¢ run software to manage and service operating system environments on the licensed

server.

â?¢ Your CALs permit access to your instances of earlier versions, but not later versions, of

the server software. If you are accessing instances of an earlier version, you may also

use CALs corresponding to that version.

â?¢ You may use the Windows Small Business Server (SBS) 2003 CAL Suite or Windows SBS

2003 CAL Suite for Premium Users or Devices instead of Windows Server 2003 CALs to

access instances of the server software within an SBS 2003 domain.

â?¢ You may use the Windows Essential Business Server (EBS) 2003 CAL Suite or Windows

EBS 2003 CAL Suite for Premium Users or Devices instead of Windows Server 2003 CALs

to access instances of the server software within an EBS 2003 domain.

iii. Types of CALs. There are two types of CALs: one for devices and one for users. Each device

CAL permits one device, used by any user, to access instances of the server software on your

licensed servers. Each user CAL permits one user, using any device, to access instances of

the server software on your licensed servers. You may use a combination of device and user

CALs.

iv. Reassignment of CALs. You may

â?¢ permanently reassign your device CAL from one device to another, or your user CAL from

one user to another; or

â?¢ temporarily reassign your device CAL to a loaner device while the first device is out of

service, or your user CAL to a temporary worker while the user is absent.

v. Windows Server 2003 Remote Desktop Services. You must acquire a Windows Server

2003 Remote Desktop Services CAL or Windows Server 2003 Terminal Services CAL for each

user or device that directly or indirectly accesses the server software to host a graphical user

interface (using the Windows Server 2003 Remote Desktop Services functionality or other

technology).

vi. Windows Server 2003 Rights Management Services CALs. In addition to needing a

Windows Server 2003 CAL, you need a Windows Server 2003 Rights Management Services

CAL for each user or device that directly or indirectly accesses the Windows Server 2003

Rights Management Services functionality.

vii. The server software can be used in either â??per device or per userâ? mode or â??per serverâ?

mode. In â??per device or per userâ? mode, you need a Windows Server 2003 CAL for each

device or user that directly or indirectly accesses instances of the server software on your

licensed servers. In â??per serverâ? mode, you need and must dedicate exclusively to an

instance of the server software as many Windows Server 2003 CALs as the greatest number

of devices and users that may directly or indirectly access that instance at the same time. Pg. 5 $\,$

You may change the mode only one time, from â??per serverâ? to â??per device or per user.â? If

you do, you will retain the same number Windows Server 2003 CALS.

b. Multiplexing. Hardware or software you use to

â?¢ pool connections,

â?¢ reroute information,

â?¢ reduce the number of devices or users that directly access or use the software,

â?¢ reduce the number of devices or users the software directly manages,

(sometimes referred to as â??multiplexingâ? or â??poolingâ?), does not reduce the number of licenses of

any type that you need.

c. Font Components. While the software is running, you may use its fonts to display and print

content. You may only

â?¢ embed fonts in content as permitted by the embedding restrictions in the fonts; and

â?¢ temporarily download them to a printer or other output device to print content.

d. Icons, images and sounds. While the software is running, you may use but not share its

icons, images, sounds, and media. The sample images, sounds and media provided with the

software are for your non-commercial use only.

e. No Separation of Server Software. You may not separate the server software for use in more

than one operating system environment under a single license, unless expressly permitted. This

 \hat{a} C Network Awareness. This feature determines whether a system is connected to a network by

either passive monitoring of network traffic or active DNS or HTTP queries. The query only

transfers standard TCP/IP or DNS information for routing purposes. You can switch off the

active query feature through a registry setting.

â?¢ Windows Time Service. This service synchronizes with time.windows.com once a week to

provide your computer with the correct time. You can turn this feature off or choose your

preferred time source within the Date and Time Control Panel applet. The connection uses

standard NTP protocol.

â?¢ IPv6 Network Address Translation (NAT) Traversal service (Teredo). This feature helps

existing home Internet gateway devices transition to IPv6. IPv6 is a next generation Internet

protocol. It helps enable end-to-end connectivity often needed by peer-to-peer applications.

To do so, each time you start up the software the Teredo client service will attempt to locate

There are two types of operating system environments, physical and virtual. A physical

operating system environment is configured to run directly on a physical hardware system.

The operating system instance used to run hardware virtualization software (e.g. Microsoft

Virtual Server or similar technologies) or to provide hardware virtualization services (e.g.

Microsoft virtualization technology or similar technologies) is considered part of the physical

operating system environment. A virtual operating system environment is configured to run Pg. 3

on a virtual (or otherwise emulated) hardware system.

Chapter 2: Known Issues with this Release

This section describes known issues with this release and suggests workarounds.

Permission Set Limitation

When bound to CA Performance Center, the CA Application Delivery Analysis management console enforces permission sets, however, the Multi-Port Monitor does not. For example, if a user has permission to a particular group of servers, and the Multi-Port Monitor can monitor at least one of the servers in the group:

- In CA Performance Center, access is limited to the servers in the permission set.
- In CA Application Delivery Analysis data source, access is limited to the servers in the permission set.
- In Multi-Port Monitor, the Analysis tab displays performance data for all servers in the domain.

If necessary, restrict CA Application Delivery Analysis data source access to avoid giving a user access to data in the Multi-Port Monitor that is outside their permission set.

Note: Restricting the Drill into Data Sources role right does not prevent a user from directly accessing the CA Application Delivery Analysis management console and Multi-Port Monitor.

Documentation Upgrade

After upgrading CA ADA from 10.0 to 10.1, links in the ADA Console Online Help incorrectly point to 10.0 documentation. To fix this problem, take the following steps:

- 1. Open the file C:\CA\SuperAgent\dotnet\Console\web.config with a text editor.
- 2. Locate the two lines:

<add key="AdminGuideLink" value="/SuperAgent/Documentation/SA_AdminGuide.pdf"/>

- 3. Change SA_UserGuide.pdf to ada_User.pdf
- 4. Change SA_AdminGuide.pdf to ada_Admin.pdf
- 5. Save the file.

Internet Explorer with Quirks Mode

When accessing the management console through Internet Explorer 8, the page formatting appears incorrect at the top of the page.

To avoid this issue, press F12 in Internet Explorer and then set the Browser Mode to IE8 and the Document Mode to Quirks.
